These stories are a great reminder to me of the incredible dedication of Wild Care's Staff. Whether they are caring for an Endangered Species like a Piping Plover, or a common species like a

White-footed Mouse, they all receive the same level of attention, medical treatment and TLC.

## Here are some stories of the everyday miracles that your support enabled this spring and summer.

An adult male Northern Cardinal was caught in a glue trap. It' likely it went after insects in the trap, only to become hopelessly glued itself. Our staff carefully and skillfully removed the bird. It received several baths once stable. We are thrilled to report that this bird was just released back home! *(See page 2 for his*)

A tiny White-footed Mouse pup received intensive homecare with staff for many weeks, and a second chance at life. The mouse fell out of a lawnmower with deceased siblings. The finder was kind enough to drive the mouse to my home in Orleans, from Sandwich. After much TLC, the mouse grew like a weed, and was released. ## *"From creatures as common as mice, to Endangered Species like Piping Plovers, they all deserve a second chance."*

A newly hatched Piping Plover chick was found in the pedestrian walkway of Head of the Meadow Beach by the Cape Cod National Seashore Shorebird Crew. It was believed to have been stepped on and was dragging its body. It was







brought to Wild Care and was hypothermic, dehydrated and immobile...

The bird received intensive care, and was provided with a plush plover family to keep it comfortable. Imagine our excitement when the chick began walking!

After rehabilitation at Wild Care for three days, the plover chick was successfully reintroduced to its plover family in Truro. Piping Plovers are a federally Endangered Species, and state listed as Threatened. Every individual is critically important to the success of the population. We were thrilled to play a role in getting this chick back out into the wild!
