# We are all connected...

These photos show Belinda Rubinstein, a Seasonal Wildlife Rehab Assistant, working on terrapin eggs!

Belinda works with a group called *New England Coastal Wildlife Alliance*, for their Diamondback Terrapin Project. On her way to work at Wild Care in early August, she got a call to pick up terrapin eggs that a landscaper had dug into and broken.

Belinda consulted with Dr. Innis, DVM, Director of Animal Health at the New England Aquarium, and he gave her some guidance. He said rinsing them with sterile saline to get sand out, and taping the eggs together, has sometimes worked. Here she is giving it a shot! Please note: Belinda is an amazing part of our team at Wild Care and is allowed to work on turtles through NECWA in Wareham. These eggs went home with her in the hopes they will survive with her care.

Thank you Belinda for sharing your skills and passion at Wild Care and NECWA - we are all lucky to have you!
